

Developing Media and Outreach Tools

FHE has developed media and outreach tools to improve gender equality and women's empowerment. These tools were developed based on a gender barrier analysis.

What are these tools?

- Gender Outreach Group
- Image Box
- Comic Book
- Participatory Theater and Cinema Screening

What Challenges Do These Tools Address?

- The power imbalance between husbands and wives
- The gap in women's involvement in community decision making
- Women's low levels of participation and poor development outcomes
- Unlocks the husband and wife's capacity to combat harmful traditional practices (e.g. Early Marriage, FGM)
- Encourages men and boys' engagement in domestic chores
- Enhances female headed household's ability to be involved in diversified livelihood activities.

How are the Tools Implemented?

Gender Outreach Groups (GoG) are couples from 15-20 households.

- The participants are selected from the same or adjacent villages and meet bimonthly to discuss eight gender themes
- Community volunteers selected by the community leaders and members are trained to play a facilitation role.
- The volunteers use the **Image Box** and **Comic Books** to lead discussions on topics such as:
 - ✓ Harmony between husband and wife for improved family life
 - ✓ Mutual respect in the family
 - ✓ Parents as role models for joint decision making on household assets
 - ✓ Women's participation in development structures and the impact on the household and local economy
 - ✓ Girl's education and food security
 - ✓ Women's access to extension services
 - ✓ Men's support in household tasks

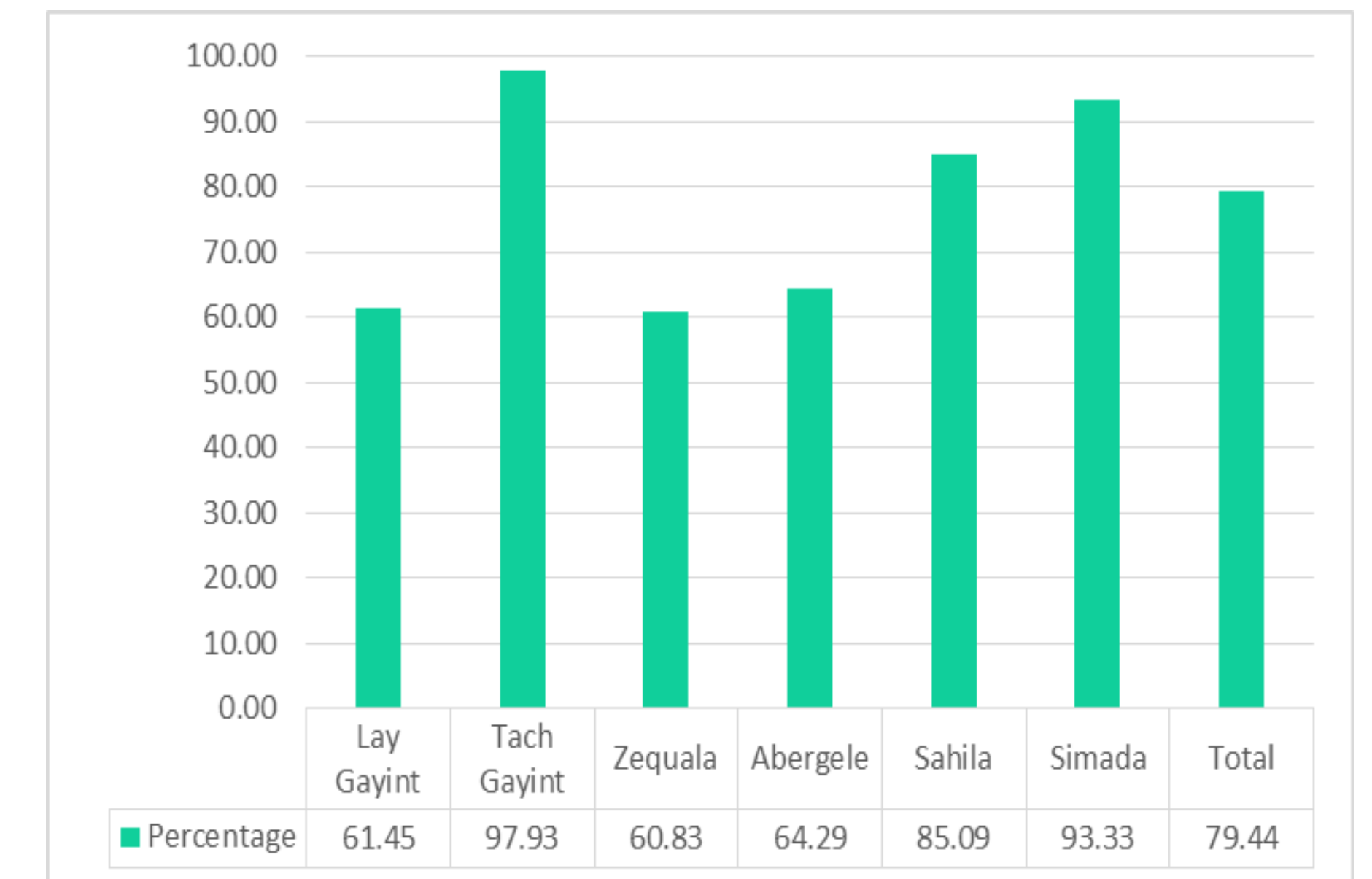
Improved Gender Relations

A survey conducted in 2017 and monitoring data indicate incremental change in:

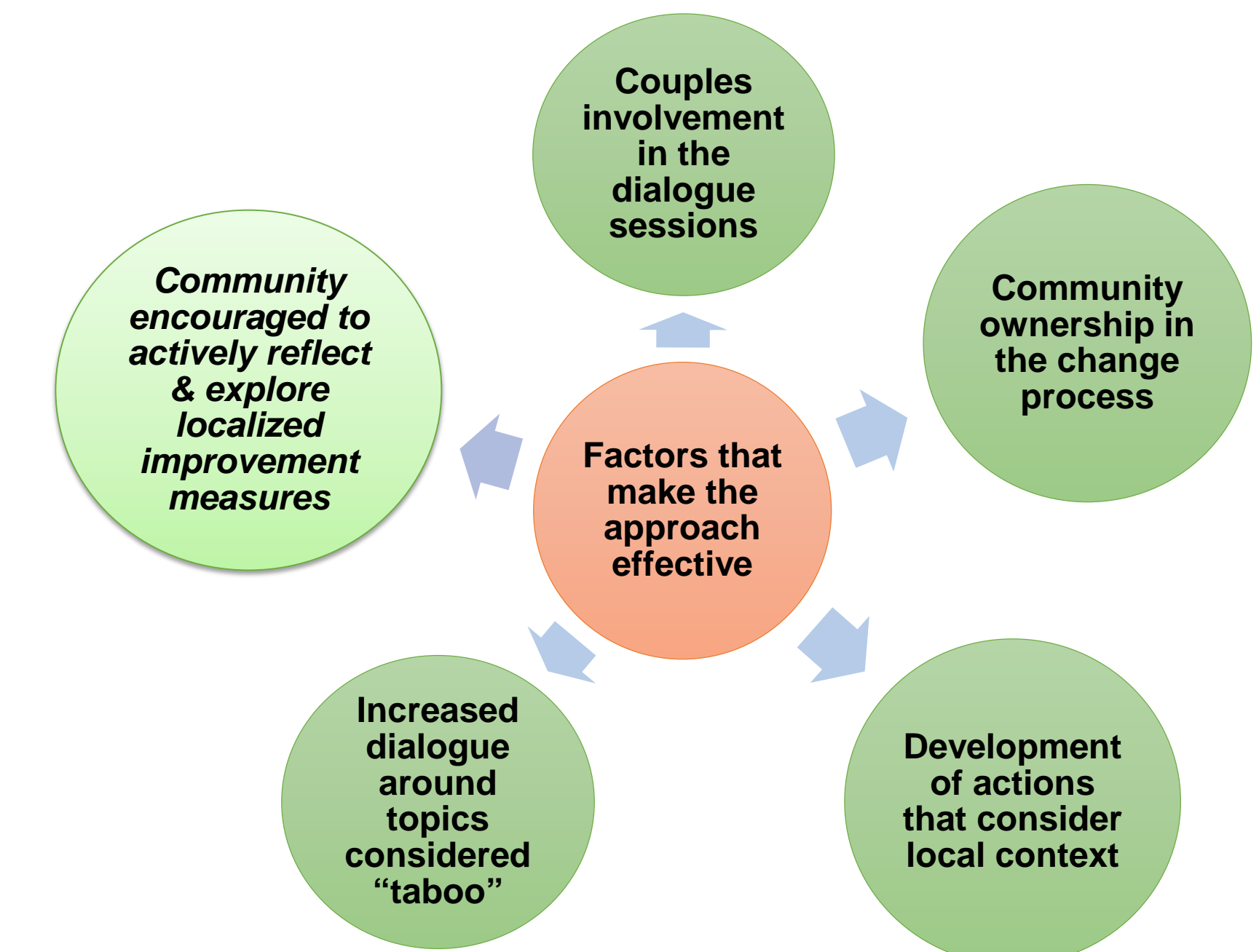
- ✓ community motivation to take the lead in promoting positive norms and joint decision making
- ✓ increased levels of women's engagement in decisions at the household and community levels
- ✓ fewer disputes between husbands and wives due to improved joint decision making practices
- ✓ strengthened social networks among the GoG members
- ✓ collaborative action towards combating gender based violence
- ✓ involvement of men and boys in domestic tasks
- ✓ Increased access to services for women
